Drawing on a decade of photographic work and research, *The Near Future* considers the psychological terrain of the Buller region. Exploring the key elements that make up the sociopolitical climate of the Westport area—coal and gold mining, cement production, natural environment and climate change. This photographic series, curated by Aaron Kreisler, raises a number of fundamental questions about the future of this place.

As Hannah Watkinson notes in regard to this body of work:

"I began photographing the coastline of the Buller region with the knowledge that at some point, in the near future, the topography would change; rising sea levels, coastal erosion, the winding Coast Road slipping towards the deep blue. In 2015 I was unaware that, like most of the timeframes in Buller, the near future would come a lot sooner than I expected and would unfold before my eyes."

Hannah Watkinson is based in Ōtautahi Christchurch. Her photographic practice considers the genres of fine art and documentary, attempting to communicate the psychological landscape and social-political environment through images. Watkinson's photographs have been acquired by the University of Canterbury's art collection through a SELECT award, and have been exhibited in Christchurch and Wellington. Completing her Master's degree in 2021 at Ilam School of Fine Arts, a book titled The Near Future is to be published, a study of the Buller region drawing on a decade of research and photographic archive.

<u>Aaron Kreisler</u> is the Head of Ilam School of Fine Arts at the University of Canterbury. A former curator at Dunedin Public Art Gallery (2008 – 2014) he produced over 50 exhibitions, including the international projects *Artists from Aotearoa/New Zealand* (co-curator L. Emmerling, Frankfurter Kunstverein, 2012) and *Where do I end and you begin* (co-curated with T. Goniwe, R. Hylton, K. Ritter and V. Shivadas, City Art Centre, Edinburgh, 2014). He is also an award-winning art writer, freelance curator and works on arts-focused initiatives.

The Near Future is presented in partnership with the University of Canterbury Ilam School of Fine Arts and CoCA Centre of Contemporary Art Toi Moroki.
